BUSHFIRE CRC NEWSLETTER JUNE 2012

REVIEW REPORT RELEASED

The Bushfire CRC is "sound and robust", with supportive and engaged stakeholders, a high quality research program, a cohort of leading international researchers and a clear vision for its future – that is the view in the final report from the Independent Review Panel on behalf of the Department of Industry, Innovation, Science, Research and Tertiary Education.

Over three days in April 2012 the Panel reviewed a broad range of activities and structures within the Bushfire CRC.

The report with its recommendations will now be considered by the Governing Board of the Bushfire CRC at its next meeting on Tuesday 26 June in Adelaide. The Board will formally respond with details on how the recommendations will be addressed. The following day, Wednesday 27 June, all partners will have the opportunity to discuss the way forward from the review at the Stakeholder Meeting.

The Panel made four major conclusions on the performance of the Bushfire CRC. It said the Bushfire CRC:

- 1. Demonstrates sound governance and committee structures that effectively involve stakeholders, researchers and end users.
- 2. Has a high level of interaction between

end users and researchers from determination of the scope of research projects through monitoring progress and in using results. It undertakes social and technical research of high quality that is valued by end users.

- 3. Manages research progress in a sound manner but with sufficient flexibility to take account of opportunities emerging during a research project.
- 4. Operates a successful postgraduate program that supports students and integrates them into the work of the CRC and that of the CRC participants.

The Panel supported the proposal for the Bushfire CRC to extend its term by 12 months to June 2014, using existing Commonwealth funds with additional resources from partners.

Although the main research program would still conclude in June 2013, a limited set of activities would be possible beyond this date. This would allow greater scope to deliver "fourth year" impacts of the research projects, allow postgraduate students to complete their courses and provide more time to transition to an ongoing research institute with a new research program.

RESEARCH ADVISORY FORUM

Hobart was the venue for the sixth Bushfire CRC Research Advisory Forum on 23-24 May 2012. The forum was hosted by the Tasmania Fire Service, with Director of Community Safety Damien Killalea opening the proceedings at the Baha'i Centre of Learning (right).

The Bushfire CRC holds the forum every six months to review the progress of ongoing projects. Researchers and lead end users are given the opportunity to present an update of their activities and invite discussion from across the members of the Bushfire CRC. The audience heard presentations from around half the current research program from researchers, students and end users.

Featured at this forum were updates on research into risk communication and



risk assessment; environmental impacts of prescribed and wildfire; incident management organisation; urban and regional planning systems and fire; legal and policy sectors; fire, fuels and risk planning in the interface; and fire behaviour under extreme weather conditions. The Performance Review Panel delivered what can only be described as a positive and encouraging report on the Bushfire CRC. Again, I would like to publicly thank everyone who contributed to the presentation of our work over these days. It clearly had a positive impact on the Panel members.

The Panel noted the strong support of stakeholders and end users, at very senior levels, to the CRC and the extent to which evidence based research from the CRC was supporting cultural change within the participant organisations.

It recommended that the Bushfire CRC could better measure its research impacts, enhance its presence in social media and increase and diversify its partner base beyond its current 45 partners to include others such as utilities and insurance industries, to better match its future research aims.

Interestingly, the Panel's main concern centred on measuring impact from the outcomes of the research. It believed we understated these actual and potential benefits.

The Panel wrote: "It was clear to the Panel that the research was being taken up with enthusiasm by participants, even where the results may not be the most palatable to those organisations. The Panel has made a number of recommendations for the CRC to measure these impacts more realistically."

I am confident we can address all the recommendations over the next 12 months.

HELP FOR WA WITH PRESCRIBED BURNS

The Bushfire CRC is assisting Western Australia's Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) with its prescribed burning program.

Risk assessment and management arrangements for prescribed burns are being examined by Bushfire CRC's independent consultants Roger Estall and Ross Runnalls, along with insight from Bushfire CRC Deputy CEO and Research Director Dr Richard Thornton, to ensure they conform to international Risk Management standards (ISO 31000).

The Bushfire CRC consultants have already been successful in assisting DEC to prepare burn plan methodology for 71 burns covering 114,000 hectares for autumn and winter 2012. Following

The amount of research that has been produced by the Bushfire CRC over the last decade can be quite overwhelming. With around 1000 items – research reports, journal articles, books, presentations, and posters – the Bushfire CRC website munities researchers and the broader

is a huge resource for communities, researchers and the broader emergency management sector.

The Bushfire CRC publication *Fire Note* was created to make all this research digestible for such a varied audience. It's not

surprising that *Fire Notes* are regularly cited as one of the most useful outputs of the Bushfire CRC – they are forwarded throughout organisations, placed on websites, used as discussion papers for workshops and handouts at conferences, reprinted in newsletters, and quoted in reports.

These four-page research summaries are co-written by the researcher and a science writer in a plain language – the reader is left with a clear understanding of what the research is about, why it is being done, how it can be used, and where to go for more details. We are close to producing a milestone of 100 *Fire Notes* – all are online at www.bushfirecrc.com/firenotes.
