

# fire catchment management groups: the final stage

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### **PROJECT TITLE:**

The potential role and efficacy of community groups in bushfire management: A case study analysis of volunteerism on the urban-rural boundary of Norton Summit/ Ashton, South Australia and Kalamunda, Western Australia.



#### **OUTCOMES**

This research strongly supports the main philosophy of the Bushfire CRC to 'deliver research outcomes that have economic and social benefit of national significance.'

The following outcomes are being achieved:

- identification of major issues in the formation and operation of Fire Catchment Management Groups
- advantages and disadvantages of Fire Catchment Management Groups
- identification of issues concerning state and non-state coordinated action. Such as, accountability, subsidiarity, regulation and dual rationality in policy
- a model/guidelines/recommendations for facilitating development of and utilising Fire Catchment Management Groups in bushfire management
- a significant contribution to the development of community self-sufficiency for fire safety

## PROGRESS

- fieldwork has been conducted in Kalamunda, WA and Norton Summit/Ashton, SA
- both case study areas are peri-urban and present a high bushfire risk.
- interviews with volunteer fire fighters in both case study areas have been carried out
- face-to-face surveys with members of the local community have been conducted
- final analysis is currently being completed
