

You are being invited to participate in a study being conducted by the Centre for Risk and Community Safety at RMIT University and the Bushfire Cooperative Research Centre. The Bushfire Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) is a major national coordinating centre for fire research and receives funding from all Australian fire and land management agencies, universities, CSIRO, the Bureau of Meteorology and the federal government.

This information sheet describes the project. Please read this sheet carefully and be confident that you understand its contents before deciding whether to participate. You can contact the investigators listed at the beginning of this form to discuss any aspect of the survey or the research process.

This project has been approved by the RMIT Human Research Ethics Committee. It is supported by the Bushfire CRC and its members. (www.bushfirecrc.com).

Why have you been contacted?

You have been invited to take part because your property lies in an area that was affected by the February 7th bushfire. Your address has been randomly selected from a list of fire affected properties that was compiled using fire maps and government records. Your name has not been obtained.

What is the project about?

The aim of this project is to find out as much as we can about people's experiences of the February 7th bushfire disaster. We hope to develop a better understanding of how to improve community safety and the "Prepare, stay and defend or leave early" policy. The project focuses on various areas relating to bushfire community safety, including:

- How is the "Prepare, stay and defend or leave early" policy understood and implemented in fire prone communities?
- What were the experiences of people affected by the recent bushfires and what did people do before and during the fires?
- Were fire related warnings and information adequate and how could they be improved?
- What would have helped people manage better?

Which member of the household should complete the survey?

Any member of the household who is **over the age of 18** can complete the survey. Ideally, the survey should be completed by the person with the most detailed knowledge about the household's experience of February 7th.

What is involved in participating?

Completing the survey is **voluntary**. You are not required to answer any questions you don't want to, and you can end the survey at any time. The survey will ask you about your thoughts and actions before, during and after the fire. It can be completed any time it suits you over the next 21 days. It normally takes between 15 to 25 minutes to complete. When the survey is complete you may return it to the Bushfire CRC in the reply paid envelope provided. **Alternatively, the survey can be completed online**. **Just go to**



www.bushfirecrc.com/research where you will find a link to a fully secure survey website. Users of the online survey should be aware that the World Wide Web is an insecure public network that gives rise to the potential risk that a user's transactions are being viewed, intercepted or modified by third parties or that data which the user downloads may contain computer viruses or other defects. This project will use an external site to create, collect and analyse data collected in a survey format. The site we are using is Surveymonkey. If you agree to participate in this survey, the responses you provide to the survey will be stored on a host server that is used by survey monkey. No personal information will be collected in the survey so none will be stored as data. Once we have completed our data collection and analysis, we will import the data we collect to the RMIT server where it will be stored securely for a period of five (5) years. The data on the surveymonkey host server will then be deleted and expunged.

What are the benefits of participating?

There may not be any direct benefit to you. However, the results of the survey will be passed from the Bushfire Co-operative Research Centre to the fire agencies. The results of this survey will form one part of the knowledge base that these agencies will use to help to improve community bushfire safety. By completing the survey you will be making an important contribution to the prevention of bushfire disasters in Victoria.

What are the risks associated with participation?

This survey will ask you to recall the events of February 7th in some detail. This may cause you some distress. If you require support in managing your reactions to the survey, you can access free counselling and support services through the **Service Access and Care Team (ph: 1300 773 352)**. You can also obtain information about your local recovery centre and the counselling and support services they provide by contacting **Professor John Handmer, Project Leader (ph: 99252307)**.

What will happen to the information I provide?

Your responses to the survey will remain **anonymous** at all times and you will not be identified in any research output. We are not collecting names and your survey will be identified only by a code that is linked to your address in a password protected file. Only the researchers undertaking the analysis of the survey will have access to this file. Your address will only be disclosed to others if (1) it is to protect you or someone else from harm, (2) a court order is produced, or (3) you provide the researchers with written permission.

The results of the survey will be used to produce a report on experiences and responses during the recent fires for the Bushfire CRC. The report will also show how the "Prepare, stay and defend or leave early" policy was applied during the bushfires and how community bushfire safety can be improved. The first report will be available well before the next fire season. More detailed analysis will follow with reports in 2010. There will also be presentations to bushfire agencies. We will provide you with a summary of the major findings of the survey upon request.

Because we are using a mail-out survey, we are not obtaining written informed consent. We assume that by completing and returning the survey you are giving your consent to participate.

What are my rights as a participant?

You have the right to: i) withdraw your participation at any time; ii) have any unprocessed data withdrawn and destroyed (provided it can be reliably identified); and iii) have any questions answered at any time.
